### How are you doing?

When Covid 19 broke out last month, France required mandatory isolation for everyone. It's now been a month. We can only leave the house for one of the approved reasons and we have to stay within a kilometer when we go out for exercise. Each time we leave it is required to sign and carry a form with you.

We were celebrating Reinhild's mom's birthday in Germany when everything closed down. Luke was traveling to America and has not tried to return to France. Reinhild has stayed in Germany to help her mom through this time, I've been working from home.

I work well independently and so the time of isolation has not been difficult. A lot of my work already happens through conference calls, so this has continued. I'm in touch with family or colleagues nearly every day. In many ways the isolation and the ease of meeting others on a video call has actually increased the contact and communication with others.

### How are the refugees doing?

Many refugees and asylum seekers feel uncertain in this time. The government offices are closed, and people don't know what will happen to their case. This triggers anxiety about the future.

The isolation has also made us find innovative ways to meet and serve the groups of refugees that we know. One group meets each Thursday for Bible and prayer time. Another group meets to do some online activities to process their stories and journeys. These are small groups and we pray they will grow and one day continue in face to face meetings.

My teammate Michael and I are assisting two groups of refugees who have special needs. (One of the categories to leave the house is to assist vulnerable people.) We are mostly delivering food, but the contact also gives us a chance to help with other needs and to simply be available to talk. Most of these are young men or families.



"Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46 is a favorite scripture for me. It has taken on a new meaning for many, especially verse 10. These weeks of isolation have felt like God touching the world to renew our awareness of life.

I have been watching a new series of the life of Christ called *The Chosen*. I appreciate the authenticity it portrays in the relationship of Jesus and His disciples.

### Dear Friends,

Thank you for reading my letter. I hope these stories give you an idea of how God is at work. Please pray for me as I prepare to teach the course online, *Mission and Migration*, May 11-15, on Mission and Migration at the Academy for World Mission near Stuttgart Germany. At the end of December we received many generous gifts and managed to begin this year with a balanced account. I thank God for you and for the many who make our work possible.

## Stewardship: Dear Fellow Members Of First Presbyterian:

As we are all consumed by the ongoing developments of the Coronavirus pandemic that has seen churches suspend worship services, I am sure that we are all praying for a quick resolution of the problem and a return to normalcy. Many of us are finding other ways to worship in anticipation of once again returning to the friendly fellowship of First Presbyterian Church, to inspirational messages and music and to the comfort of worship with fellow Christians.



In looking forward to the time of re-opening all services the question arises as to whether things with the church might ever be the same as before. We are going through a transitional period without a pastor, and this challenge has now been compounded by a shutdown due to the Coronavirus. We, as Christians, know that there are things beyond our control and that only God is in charge. We must remember Jim Luedtke's favorite acronym, FROG, and FULLY RELY ON GOD to get us through these unique and challenging times. In relying on God, however, we need to open our hearts to His Holy Spirit for guidance as to how we can help First Presbyterian persevere through this period and come out on the other side as prepared, or better, to do God's will, as we were when services were suspended.

Stewardship means many things such as prayers, presence and service, as well as gifts. In times such as these, when we cannot contribute by being present at worship, we can still pray and seek opportunities to serve; and of course, we can still honor God with our gifts.

As we conduct our search for a new pastor it is critically important that as a church we present with involved, committed members if we are to attract the kind of pastor for which we are all looking. One indicator of this, among others, is the financial commitment of the members to maintain and grow an active and vibrant church.

Even though we have suspended services the church still has the same ongoing expenses as it did prior to the suspension. We have utility bills, maintenance costs, and employee payroll to cover each month. The annual budget for the church this year is \$218,785.00. In order to meet the budget we need monthly donations averaging \$18,232.08. For the first quarter (January, February, & March) we needed to have income totaling \$54,696.24 to achieve this average, but collected only \$49,286.59 from offerings, a deficit of \$5,409.65. As everyone can see, the numbers speak for themselves.

St. Paul, in his second letter to the Corinthians, tells us: *“Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all you need, you will abound in every good work.”*



Brothers and Sisters in Christ, God calls on us at this time to search our hearts and consider our pledges; or if we have not pledged to consider what we can give to His greater glory. Together in Christ we can maintain our mission and operations at First Presbyterian, and be better for having, with God's help, met and overcome our adversities.

## Stay Safe

I recently heard a story of some workers who were painting a 125-foot-high bridge in Canada. They had been working for almost a year. Nearing the completion of the project there was an accident where the scaffolding they were using collapsed. Four were killed and seven others were rescued after clinging for more than an hour to the underside of the bridge. Officials asked why they weren't using safety equipment. The answer: they had the equipment, but they chose not to use it. I can relate to this story for several reasons. We all can and do experience scary times, though not nearly as dramatic. We are currently experiencing scary times. And we may feel like we are barely hanging on, but there is security equipment available for us, IF we simply choose to use it. One prophet asked "Will ye reject these words? Will ye reject the words of the prophets, and reject all the words that have been spoken concerning Christ?"

The Lord sent us here to Earth to have a myriad of experiences. Some are great, others are stressful. It is during the stressful times that we learn and grow the most. The Lord provided safety equipment for us, prayer, the scriptures, and the Holy Ghost to be a "safety net" to catch us and an "iron rod" or Word of God, to hold on to through this journey we call life. The scriptures are full of examples of people who had fallen in sin, but then turned back to the Lord and He provided them with comfort and peace of mind. I think of Saul who was persecuting Christians, repented and became Paul one of the great prophets of old. The Gospel of Jesus Christ can bring a mighty change in the hearts of those who seek Him. He wants to help us through our journey, and when we turn to our scriptures daily, especially in times of stress, He will be found, and a peace can be felt even though we are still in the midst of hard times. I know this to be true. I have had several experiences in life where I have chosen to leave aside the "safety equipment" and found myself clinging for hope. But when I returned to church and the scriptures, I truly found a "change of heart" and found peace and comfort. I know the Lord loves me, and you, and wants us to return to Him. We ask for your knowledge and blessing, Your comfort and forgiveness, and strength of Your Holy Spirit to live according to Your will.
