To my Sisters and Brothers in Christ at First Presbyterian Church of South Boston, Virginia.

Warmest greetings from your new transitional pastor.

Today, I have paused while moving to share few words with you. I have recently asked myself, "Who in their right mind moves to a new residence in the middle of a Global Pandemic?" The answer is—those who listen for and obey the call of God. When God calls, we Christians obey. When God called Abraham to leave his home and travel to an unknown location, God promised to be with him and to prosper him in many ways. Abraham believed God and moved from his home through God's direction. Abraham was an ordinary and sinful man, but because he believed and acted upon God's Word, God counted it to him as righteousness.

How will we use our freedom?

In 2000, Cornealious Anderson was sentenced to 13 years for robbery. The 23-year-old was released on bail and told to await orders to show up to prison. But due to a clerical error, those orders never came. Some people might have taken advantage of such freedom and committed more crimes. But Anderson started a business, coached youth football and volunteered at church, earning respect in his community.

Thirteen years later, when Missouri officials discovered the error and put Anderson behind bars, an online

petition called for his release. A judge agreed that Anderson was a changed man and, again, he was freed.

What would you do with such undeserved freedom? What do we do with the unmerited freedom God grants us despite our sin, and with the freedoms we celebrate on July 4? May we follow Anderson's example and use our freedoms — social and spiritual — to serve others.

Masks were worn by ushers and congregants arriving and departing. As every other pew is closed, many removed, or partially removed, their masks during service. Most wore masks for our unison responses.

Chris Jones played his beautiful music as we meditated on the words we would have otherwise sung.

Walks With Jesus demonstrated how we can "sink" and be overcome with worldly and personal concerns. We saw how the sweetness of God's love, through His Holy Spirit, can support, protect, and lift us up to serve to God's glory; we can rise above the "worldly" and live for God, trusting Him and accepting His protection of us. Sang David, in Psalm 86:10, "..for you, O Lord, have helped me and comforted me."

Jane Lyon delivered a powerful message, "Run Toward Your Giant", incorporating Matthew 10:24-39 (with Jesus' instructions to His disciples) with the story of David and Goliath in 1 Samuel 17. She helped us recognize the 'giants' in our lives and encouraged us to try a different tactic. Like David, saturate our mind with God. Face our Father first and most. Then in faith run toward our giant, declaring, "By the Power of God, in the name of Jesus, you can't have me giant, you're going down!"

We didn't need to sing with voices to sing in our minds and hearts, "We Need Thee Every Hour", following Jane's message; that was made clear by her and it closed a meaningful worshipful experience.

I'm grateful for our Elders for deciding to resume services and for our Committee who worked diligently to open church by following guidelines to provide a safe and comfortable experience for all who attended, with hopes of a meaningful worship experience.

The Committee consisting of Carter Henderson, Carol Foster, Kelly Chappell, Rick Harrell, and me will continue to re-evaluate and make changes as needed for your safe and pleasant Worship experience at 1st Presbyterian. We welcome your feedback.

I have been thinking much about our wonderful country and our founding fathers who fought for our freedom. I was listening to some thoughts about "Freedom" I read that many view the word as "freedom from" as from pain, oppression, bondage, etc. God intended for us to have freedom. To be able to choose good or evil, and to choose to serve Him.

Often, these days it seems to me that the word is used too frequently to allow people to misbehave then get away with it.

I have heard people say that church regulates to much of one's life, and some may think laws and commandments are too restrictive. In wanting to be "free" they choose to ignore laws and/or God. However, I like to think of a kite, and how it only will fly if a string is attached and anchoring it.

We too, need an anchor. Throughout scriptures, the Lord told prophets that if we cease to trust, honor, and obey His commandments, and turn to evil ways that we will have to pay the consequences.

During Jeremiah's time he tried to tell people to repent. He lamented that people were choosing wickedness and the Lord spoke to him, we read in Jeremiah 11:3 "And say thou unto them, Thus saith the Lord God of Israel; Cursed be the man that obeyeth not the words of this covenant" and then in verse 9, "A conspiracy is found among the men of Judah, and among the inhabitants of Jerusalem." Then in verse 11, "Therefore thus saith the Lord, Behold, I will bring evil upon them, which they shall not be able to escape; and though they shall cry unto me, I will not hearken unto them."

I am saddened by sites and news all around me. I feel like times are resembling those of Jeremiah. As a prophet he was trying to convince his people to repent. Though Jeremiah tried to convince the people, they hardened their hearts, and would not hear. Soon afterwards they were scattered and captured into bondage by Assyria.

We also read in scripture that whoever "seeks to overthrow the freedom of [this] nation... [will] bring to pass the destruction of all people". We need to turn to the Lord, I was so hopeful that with this health crisis it would lead the nation back to realizing where to turn for peace, so that we can maintain our freedoms. The scriptures are full of examples of what happens when we turn away. I am grateful for this country and the freedoms we have; I pray we remember to whom we owe this blessing. ~ *Sherylyn*
