First Pres. Family,

I always think of Memorial Day as the beginning of summer even though the solstice does not occur until June 20 or 21. In my grade school days I usually marched in the Memorial Day parade as a boy scout and that parade marked the beginning of the countdown to the end of the school year. In those days the teachers took for granted that their student's interests would be outside of the classroom, so we were treated to educational trips to local attractions.



Historical sites and museums were the usual fare, but then, as a kind of finale the whole school would go to an amusement park for a day. Students were set free to enjoy all the rides and carnival type entertainments that they wanted. Teachers and administrators would roam the park keeping an eye on the children, but also pausing for some refreshment or recreation themselves. It was a full day away from the pressures of schedule and work. I remember that feeling of released tension and the joy of seeing classmates and teachers enjoying a break from the routine. It was a trip that I looked forward to taking each year.

In my life as a pastor, I am often reminded of God's gift of the Sabbath and the idea of Jubilee. The Old Testament reveals God's plan for his people to set aside the seventh day for holy rest. Every seven years was to be a Sabbath for the land, then every forty-ninth year represented a Jubilee wherein the earth rested from cultivation and people were returned to their land for family reunions, debts were cancelled, and celebrations of liberty were held. In my memory, those last weeks of the school year were a combination of Sabbath and Jubilee.

It has been a tough year living under the pandemic restrictions and coping with various challenges. You/we deserve a break. God knows us better than we know ourselves and God has given us the gift of the Sabbath. While I hope everyone observes a weekly Sabbath and attends worship, I also invite you to take some time this summer to take a break from the routine stresses of life. Find a place and time outside of the normal grind to refresh and renew. "*Repent therefore, and turn back, that your sins may be blotted out,*²⁰ *that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, and that he may send the Christ appointed for you, Jesus.*" Acts 3:19-20a

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2021 will occur on Monday, May 31.

Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. “The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land,” he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn’t the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Civil War soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor the dead on separate days until after World War I. ~ Newsletter/Newsletter



Jesus is everything

Although growing up as a PK (pastor’s kid) could be challenging, admits Ray Ortlund Jr., it also was “a sacred privilege given to me as a gift from God.” Ortlund — now a pastor, father and grandfather himself — notes that any difficulties associated with the role were more than offset by his dad’s love and admiration, as well as “the real Christianity I saw in him.”

When Ray Sr. was on his deathbed in 2007, family members gathered in a California hospital to read Scripture, sing hymns and receive a personalized blessing from the patriarch. Ray Jr. was ministering overseas and had to say his earthly goodbyes via the phone. “Later I asked my sister about Dad’s message to me,” Ortlund writes. “It was this: ‘Tell Bud ministry isn’t everything. Jesus is.’ My dad’s dying words summed up his parenting and his whole life.” ~ Newsletter/Newsletter

We too, can become stronger when we “hang on” to our faith, and not allow others’ mistakes and errors to deter us from church attendance or our beliefs. I heard a quote once “Doubt your doubt, before you doubt your faith.” I really like that quote. We are also commanded in scripture to “Look unto [Christ] in every thought; doubt not, fear not”.

In fact, we are to be of one heart and mind, just as Christ and the Father are of one thought, purpose, and intent; for “if [we] are not one [we] are not [His].

I have made many errors in my life, and I can – ashamedly say, I was not always “All in”, but now I am “all in.” I know that God the Father, and His Son Jesus Christ love me, and I pray I will be fearless in sharing the Good News of the gospel of Jesus Christ. His atoning sacrifice for me, His unyielding forgiveness of my sins, IF and when I repent are great strengths to me. I know my Redeemer Lives! He and His gospel are true, and perfect.

We are only humans and far from perfect, so we need to be more understanding and forgiving of others’. I love Christ and want to be found worthy, as Peter, to be called one of








Session Notes: **Since our last Newsletter, our Session discussed:**

The Session met on Tuesday, May 18, 2021.

1. Rev. Coleman updated the Session on congregational news.
2. The minutes of the April 20th Session and Diaconate meetings were read and approved as written by the Session.
3. Changes to the Virginia minimum wage law were discussed.
4. Cynthia Coleman has requested membership by transfer of letter. She will meet with the Session on June 6th before the worship service.
5. Mike Freshour (Commissioner from FPC) gave a report on the May 1st Presbytery Meeting.
6. First four months financial reports were reviewed.
7. An outdoor fellowship event is being planned by the Deacons for June 13th after the worship service. This will be to officially welcome Rev. Glenn Coleman and his wife Cynthia to our church, and to honor our High School graduates.
8. Next communion will be Sunday, June 6, 2021.
9. Based on the changes to the CDC and State guidelines, the Session approved the following changes be put into effect immediately:
 - facemasks no longer required for fully vaccinated members,
 - congregational singing to resume,
 - the blocked off pews be reopened while proper social distancing is maintained.
 Warnings will be posted stating that un-vaccinated persons should wear masks and take proper precautions. Non-compliance is at personal risk and liability.
10. Work continues developing the Church Operations & Policy Manual.
11. Graduate recognition will take place during the June 13th worship service.
12. A renewal of the Interim Pastor contract (July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022) for Rev. Glenn Coleman was approved by the Session.
