

First Pres. Family,

On Friday July 23, 2021 the XXXII Olympic Games opened in Tokyo, Japan. The games were originally scheduled for 2020 but were postponed due to the COVID19 Pandemic. It is always a pleasure to see the best athletes compete. I know many of us will be following team USA in the various competitions. New Olympic stars will emerge and become known for their victories and achievements. It is interesting to consider how those new stars are able to excel. The answer is innovation.

Olympic games have been going on for many years and, given the nature of the events, we might think that there would be the same level of achievement from one Olympiad to the next. But in virtually every sport there is innovation. Training and nutrition programs, skills development, technique analysis, and equipment improvements, are just a few of the ways that athletes seek to innovate for that competitive edge.

You may remember the 1968 Olympics when the world was astounded by a young man named Richard Douglas Fosbury who introduced a new high jump technique that won him a gold medal. His innovation became known as the Fosbury Flop. That innovation made him one of the most influential athletes in the history of track and field. His technique has been adopted by almost all high jumpers today. I had competed in high jump in my High School days and when I witnessed the genius of Fosbury's technique, I wondered: "Why didn't I think of that?"

The Olympic games remind us that in every human endeavor there is always room for innovation. I believe that this principle also applies to Christ's Church. The sixth chapter of Acts reminds us that the Apostles had to innovate to allow the early church to continue to grow. The original Apostles were too busy teaching and preaching to oversee the distribution of food. Some church members were being neglected and left out, so they prayed about it and came up with the first innovation – Deacons!

We face a time when mainline traditional Churches have been declining in membership and influence. Pews are more sparsely populated on Sunday morning and those who attend are predominantly of retirement age or older. The traditional Church is in decline and will have to innovate if it is to survive. Some innovators have already broken with tradition, like the Cowboy Churches, who meet on weeknights for those who cannot or do not desire to attend traditional services. The dress is "come as you are" and the music is often contemporary. There are Cowboy churches here in Virginia, not far from here there is also a Christian fellowship that meets around old-time music and folk dancing.

It is clear that some of our sisters and brothers in Christ are innovating to preserve the witness of their churches to their community. We need to remind ourselves that the only reason for the existence of the church is to follow the Great Commission of Christ to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20). Churches go about fulfilling this commission in various and unique ways. So, if we return to this task as our primary goal and innovate ways to fulfill that commission in our unique place and time God will bless our efforts with success.

Church Financial Note - With the first half of the year concluded a review of the financial condition of the church shows the following:

The year to date (January through June) budget established by the Session for the first half of the year is \$106,805.51. Offerings received for this same period totaled \$94,454.31 resulting in a budget deficit for the first half of \$12,351.20. For the first six months of last year offerings totaled \$98,426.81, \$3,972.50 more than this year. At first glance this may not appear concerning, but the receipts for 2021 are inflated by the fact that two families paid their entire pledges for the year in January and February. Weekly contributions during the spring and summer have fallen off fairly significantly from 2020.

The Session has taken action to reduce expenses in several areas. Foreign mission support has been eliminated for all but Matthew and Teresa Lee and The Persecution Project. The lawn maintenance contract with Reaves Lawn & Garden has been terminated and cost reduced by purchasing a lawn tractor and hiring Avon to do the work. Also, expenses are less this year because we have no current obligation to Vanderbloemen, our pastor search firm.

The church, however, has an expense this year that it did not have in the first half of 2020, that is the salary and benefits paid to a full time pastor. (Glenn, our interim pastor, was hired effective 7/1/20) This expense will continue, and possibly increase with the hiring of a full time pastor.

The Session will continue to look for ways to reduce costs in a financially responsible manner; however, as the stewardship drive will be coming in the fall, we ask each member to prayerfully consider his or her personal financial commitment to First Presbyterian Church. We have a wonderful ministry ongoing with Glenn's leadership, and exciting times ahead as we continue to search for a new pastor to continue God's work through our church. It is important that we prepare for this with a sound financial commitment.

May the Lord each of you for the work you do for First Presbyterian.

The Rabbit Effect

I was teaching a class in church recently and learned of a research project in the 70's. It was to see how diet affects heart health. Rabbits were the test subjects. It's interesting to find out that one group had significantly better health outcomes though fed the same high fatty foods in the same quantities. After much confusion and repeating the experiment, it was determined that the difference was the handler, one kind woman who talked to the rabbits, pet them, and showed them love as she fed them. This study has continued to influence scientists today. Dr. Kelli Harding published a book titled *The Rabbit Effect*. This research shows the effect that love, and touch has on other's health.

We are commanded to be loving, kind, inclusive to all those around us. As we do this, we can be saviors of a sort to those we encounter and socialize. As we follow Christ's example and listen to His commands, we also will find the world around us to be a happier, brighter, and much friendlier place. We are all God's children. 



The Session met on Tuesday, July 20, 2021.

1. Rev. Coleman updated the Session on congregational news.
2. The minutes of the June 15th, Session meeting were read and approved as written by the Session.
3. The Peaks Presbytery Committee on Ministry has approved our Interim Pastor contract renewal.
4. The PNC is attempting to continue dialog with the last candidate that was interviewed. The lack of response to our communications is disappointing.
5. Membership Roll – Chastain Frederick (Freddy) Collins passed away on July 9, 2021.
6. Next communion will be Sunday, August 8, 2021 (moved from August 1 due to Rev. Coleman being away).
7. Work continues on developing the Church Operations & Policy Manual.
8. There was discussion about planning fellowship events and meals.
9. Rally Day will be Sunday, September 12th.
10. First six months financial reports were reviewed. Giving is down, we are over \$12,000 behind year-to-date vs the 2021 budget.
