A Season of Prayer

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. Philippians 4:6

As October begins and the fall season is upon us, I have become aware that we are also entering a new season of prayer. Throughout this summer we have been praying for various concerns: people who are ill, families who have lost loved ones, doctors, nurses, first responders, who bear a heavy burden due to the COVID19 pandemic, the political and philosophical divisions in our country, our government leaders, men and women of our armed services, the Church, and many other concerns. These concerns are still with us, and I hope you pray each day for these and your personal concerns. God wants to hear our concerns and cares because our prayers deepen our relationship with God through Christ. Jesus gave us the Lord's prayer to encourage us to bring our cares and concerns to God. Jesus also taught his disciples to observe the world around them and maintain awareness of the changing world and the physical and spiritual needs around them.

And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. Ephesians 6:18

We observe our church and community, and we realize that we are entering a new season of prayer because we have new concerns that we want to bring to the Lord in prayer. On October 10, 2021 we will begin our stewardship campaign, which is not just a matter of pledge cards and budgets, but a time of prayer for each church member to examine their current giving and ask the Lord's guidance for the coming year. We know that contributions are down, and the church is operating on a significant deficit. What is the Lord calling upon you to do?

¹³ Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. ¹⁴ Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵ And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. James 5:13-15

On October 24, 2021 our church will convene a congregational meeting to elect members to the nominating committee in order to begin the process of electing classes of elders and deacons. Just as stewardship requires a new season of prayer, so does the process of selecting leadership. First Presbyterian Church of South Boston is blessed with members who have demonstrated a wide variety of skills and talents as well as deep dedication to Christ and his church. Could the Lord be calling you to serve? Please be in prayer for the process and your personal role. What is the Lord calling upon you to do?

There are other important seasonal issues that need our prayers: November elections, children's education as the pandemic continues, and do not forget to pray for your Pastor Nominating Committee.

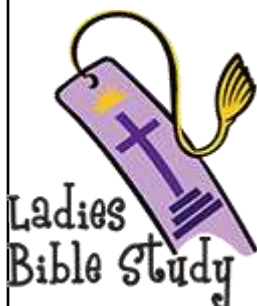

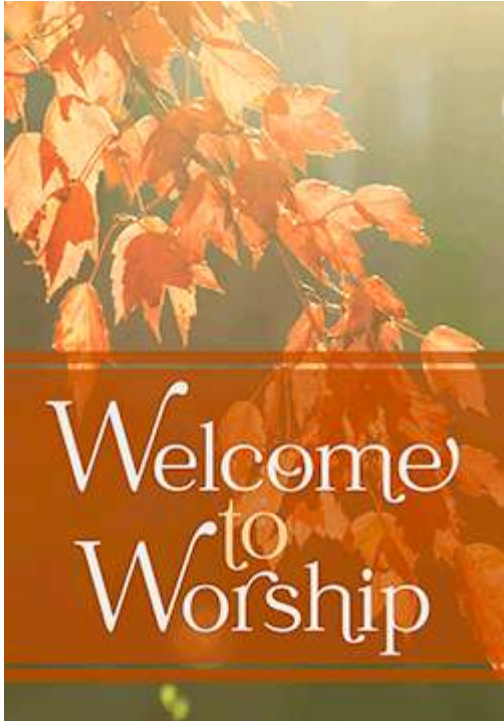

Have you ever “judged” someone to later find your “judgment” was incorrect?

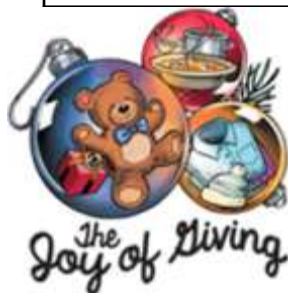
There are so many examples and admonitions to not judge another, and yet as humans we often find ourselves doing just that, sometimes before we even realize we have done so. Some of these admonitions come from old sayings, here are a couple: “Never judge a book by its cover”, “Never judge another man until you have walked a mile in his footsteps”. One of my favorite scenes is in the movie Bambi. I am sure you all remember, when Bambi was very young and learning to walk then his legs went out from under him. Thumper saw him and said, “He doesn’t walk very well, does he?” Afterward, Thumper’s mother asks him what his father had just told him that morning. Thumper replies, “If you can’t say somethin’ nice, don’t say nothin’ at all.” Another saying I’ve heard:



*There is so much good in the worst of us,
And so much bad in the best of us,
That it ill behooves any of us
To find fault with the rest of us.*

All of these stories and sayings give evidence that we should heed the council of the Lord, where we read in multiple scriptures to “judge not” or to “judge righteously.” (see Luke 6:37, and/or Leviticus 19:15). One scripture states that we should say in our hearts – “let God judge between me and thee, and reward thee according to thy deeds”. As human beings we often find it hard to take that attitude, but ultimately God will be the judge, and we know His judgment is just. We need to trust the Holy Ghost which “leadeth to judge righteously”. We are all children of God, and He loves each and every one of us. Giving Is a Joy - As we approach Stewardship season, I saw this article on the Presbytery website. “They say money can’t buy happiness, but research indicates this may not be entirely true. The trick is to focus on what you *give*, rather than what you *get*.” So, where should you go to “purchase” this joy?” The answer: your church and charities. The key is the word *donate*. Those who donate money tend to be happier than those who don’t.

Research also shows that those who give regularly are happier than those who only give one time. And it’s not just happiness that is affected; people in pledging households are more optimistic about their future and are more likely to believe that people can generally be trusted. The one caveat, the research can not tell if donating makes one happier, or if happier people are the ones who donate, but either way, it’s clear that donating is a clear sign of happiness. Session Notes: **Since our last Newsletter, our Session discussed:**

The Session met on Tuesday, September 21, 2021.

1. Rev. Coleman opened the meeting with prayer and updated the Session on congregational news.

2. A congregational meeting has been set for Sunday, October 24th for the purpose of electing a minimum of four members to serve on the Nominating Committee to form a ballot for church officers for the Class of 2024.

3. A congregational meeting has been set for Sunday, November 14th for the purpose of electing church officers for the Class of 2024 and to present the budget for 2022.

4. The PNC report is currently in conversation with a promising candidate. Discussion is continuing and we are hopeful that this will yield a positive result.

5. Christian Education - Rally Day was held Sunday, September 12th. Due to concerns over growing COVID-19 infection rates, there was no meal served prior to worship service and teacher recognition took place during the service.

6. The special offering to support the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) for Haiti on August 29th, was successful. \$1750 was collected.

7. The Deacons have taken on this year's Stewardship Campaign to begin on October 10th.

8. Finance Committee - First eight months financial reports were reviewed. Giving is down, we are nearly \$25,000 behind year-to-date vs the 2021 budget.

9. Worship Committee - Next communion will be Sunday, October 3, 2021.

10. Work continues developing the Church Operations & Policy Manual. The Deacons have helped develop the Wedding and Funeral policies.

11. Rev. Coleman closed the meeting with prayer.
