First Pres. Family,

The holiday season is upon us. With the holiday season at hand the church office has been busier than usual with people getting or leaving their Christmas Child Shoeboxes, attending meetings, or Bible studies. It seems that this time of year our activity level reaches the point where we get weary of the frantic pace. I heard one person comment that being a church member sure required a lot of activity. That comment caught my attention because one of the revelations that we can receive from studying the gospels is that wherever and whenever Jesus was present there was always a lot of activity. There was always motion around him and he was always in motion.

Consider the movement related to his birth. Following the angel's announcement of pregnancy to Mary she traveled to visit her cousin Elizabeth who was pregnant with John (the Baptist). Subsequently, Mary and Joseph were required to travel to Bethlehem for a census. As they finally found accommodations, Shepherds were alerted to the birth and traveled to the place of his birth. Meanwhile, in a faraway land, astronomers (Magi) assembled a caravan to take the long journey to Bethlehem because they had discerned the birth from ancient prophesy and the appearance of the star of Bethlehem. This activity count is not even a complete picture, for we have not mentioned the people awaiting the birth at the temple or the astronomers, astrologers, scribes, and soldiers that Herod set to work to find the birthplace.

Even a quick review of the gospels will alert us to the fact that Jesus and his disciples were always on the move. When Jesus called disciples there was movement implicit in the call, he said: "Come follow me." There were few times recorded where Jesus was not traveling, teaching, or healing. They did stop to eat occasionally; some mealtimes are documented in the gospel record culminating in the last supper. Yet, even when he tried to find a quiet place to rest and recuperate, the crowds followed demanding his ministry. To be a follower of Jesus is to be always moving forward. The Apostle Paul likened it being in a race. Near the end of his ministry, he wrote to his dear friend Timothy: *I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.*

We who follow Jesus are always moving forward from blessing to blessing, fighting the good fight, keeping the faith, bearing the good news, and blessing others as we have been blessed. In Christ our lives are moving ever forward to the day when we will meet Him face to face. So, keep moving forward in faith: it is the best formula I know for having a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!


Stewardship - We are grateful for those who sent in their 2022 pledge. Pledges totaled 67% of the 2022 budget.

Food security is a major concern for the marginalized and persecuted people of Sudan, so unless you live in an urban area, you're going to farm and manage livestock.

Most Nuba people have their own gardens, requiring just basic tools for managing. But many institutions like schools and hospitals run larger-scale operations to support their students, staff, or patients.

Persecution Project has sponsored, throughout history, many agricultural projects, emergency food distributions, greenhouse construction and provide cows and goats to those displaced by conflict.

At the Gigaiba Referral Hospital, Persecution Project is partnering with Dr. Ahmed and his team to provide a heavy-duty John Deere tractor to help the facility plant on a scale to provide food security for a growing number of staff and patients. It is so expensive to ship anything into the country, we are grateful to have a company like John Deere who has the ability to provide the tractor in country. Our Session approved the Poinsettia money to go toward this project.

Virtual Poinsettia Ministry -

Each year we decorate the sanctuary with poinsettia flowers, and folks are given the opportunity to donate them in honor, or in memory

of, loved ones. We will purchase a certain number, but any number of virtual poinsettias may be given. The cost this year is \$25 per poinsettia. Dollars above the actual cost will be used to help buy wreaths and garlands for outside the church, and the rest will be given to help purchase a tractor for a hospital.

And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.” – Matthew 28:16-20 (NIV)





Session Notes: **Since our last Newsletter, our Session discussed:**

The Session met on Tuesday, November 16, 2021.

1. Rev. Coleman opened the meeting with prayer and updated the Session on congregational news.
2. Don Cherry attended Advanced Clerk of Session training hosted by Rev. Dave Baker, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery.
3. Rick Harrell will serve as Commissioner at the virtual Presbytery meeting on Thursday, November 18TH.
4. The PNC has ongoing conversations with a promising candidate. Vanderbloemen is preparing to present some additional candidates.
5. Property report: The new circulation pump on the heating system was installed.
6. Frances Harrell will form a committee to gather quotes to renovate the Pastor's Study.
7. Operation Christmas Child update. 29 boxes were picked up, 13 boxes returned and 10 online donations.
8. The Stewardship Campaign update. 64% [67%] of the budget pledged to date.
9. Finance Committee – The October financial reports were reviewed. Giving is down, we are over \$37,000 behind year-to-date vs the 2021 budget.
10. Worship Committee - Next communion will be Sunday, December 5, 2021, and during the Christmas Eve Service.
11. Work continues developing the Church Operations & Policy Manual.
12. Next month will be a joint meeting of the Session and Diaconate. Newly elected officers are invited to attend.
13. Rev. Coleman closed the meeting with prayer.
