Out of the Darkness There Comes A Light!

Lighting the Advent Wreath in the Tradition of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love

MERRY CHRISTMAS!! "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." – John 3:16 (NIV).

Last Sunday, began the liturgical calendar year for 2023 and also the start of Advent. "Advent" from the Latin "adventus" means "coming." As Christians Advent is a special time dedicated to celebrate the coming, or birth of Christ, our Lord and Savior. Looked at another way, Advent is a time for penitence, prayer and worship that symbolizes Christ, the Light, coming into the darkness and bringing hope, peace, joy and love. One way our church symbolizes this coming of Christ Jesus is through the lighting of the Advent wreath.

The Advent wreath has five candles; three purple, one rose/pink and in the center, a large white candle. Three of the candles are purple because violet is a liturgical color which signifies a time of prayer, penance and sacrifice; the rose/pink candle symbolizes "Joy" and the large, white candle is the "Christ" candle. Last Sunday during worship we lit the first purple candle which symbolizes "Hope" and the feeling of expectation of the coming of Christ. The second week of Advent will bring the lighting of the second purple candle known as the "Peace" candle contemplating the peace brought by a Christ centered life as demonstrated by Joseph and Mary. Despite how their families and community may have looked at them, their faith and belief in God and the coming Christ brought them peace. The third week of advent, the rose/pink candle is lit symbolizing "Joy" to express the joy of the coming of Christ and the salvation he brings to the world. With hope and peace, we are joyful but we are not complete Christians without God's love. The fourth week of advent we light the final purple candle known as the "Love" candle. When we know God's love, we are called to share that love with others AND love one another as God loves us. Finally, on Christmas Day, we will light the Christ candle, celebrating the birth of Christ. The Christ candle sits at the center of all the other candles to remind us that Jesus Christ is at the center of all we do and all we are.



As co-chair of the Worship committee, I have learned so much more than I ever imagined in preparing for worship during Advent. The colors, the symbology, and all that goes with it. I hope this shortened explanation kindles, or re-kindles, a greater appreciation of Advent and a greater understanding of what it means to celebrate the birth and coming of Christ. I believe, though, that we should keep the Advent candles in our hearts and mind through out the year. My wish for all is that each and every one of us remember there is always Hope; Christ will never forsake his children. When we find life overwhelming and hard, Christ will bring us Peace when we trust and follow him faithfully. No matter how dark our lives or world may seem, as the Psalmist reminds us, Joy always comes in the morning. Finally, God sent us Christ out of Love and with Love for ourselves and one another, we can truly lead a Christ centered life.

Just a Few Shoeboxes - As one of your elders for World and Local Missions I am thrilled to report on the success of our Operation Christmas Child shoebox drive this holiday season. I challenged you to a higher than usual goal of 50 boxes in light of the overwhelming humanitarian needs in today's world. You met and exceeded that goal with a whopping total of 85 boxes filled! God's presence is certainly growing here!

And just look at the ripple effect our 85 little shoeboxes will create.

Every shoebox gifts departs on an amazing journey. Long before shoeboxes arrive in more than 100 countries, volunteer National Leadership Teams train pastors and community leaders who want to share the message of the Gospel and bless children. They learn how to host child-friendly outreach events, and how to implement the follow-up discipleship program.

Pastors around the world host outreach events in places where people may not know Christ and invite them to follow Him. Other churches use the boxes as resources for outreach in orphanages and other at-risk areas.

Pastor Waisea Liwaiono hosted an Operation Christmas Child outreach in Vunika, a rural community in Fiji that had no church. He then invited the children to attend the follow-up discipleship program. As the students gathered for Bible lessons, their parents grew curious and began attending, too. The local witch doctor became a believer and offered his property as a place for the new church to meet. Today 80 people attend regularly, and five additional churches have been started in surrounding villages!

Elizabeth Groff received a shoebox gift years ago as a lonely child in an orphanage in Ukraine. She received her shoebox gift during a time she described as 'rock bottom.' "I was alone. I felt lost. That is where Jesus met me. He didn't leave me there," she said. "He showed me that He loved and cared for me through a simple gift – through a shoebox." Elizabeth's favorite item in her box was a shiny yellow yo-yo. "It represented love. Someone cared enough to send me this box," she said. Elizabeth went on to start a shoebox club at her school; then, as a student at Virginia Tech, she headed a 300-member shoebox club on campus. Now she's packing shoeboxes with family and friends and continues to share her incredible story of God's faithfulness.


