Do we desire the deep things of God? Do we strive to understand the complexity, and the beauty, of salvation history? Do we ponder God's infinite and unchangeable character that compelled Him to act in the

manner of covenantal love towards a fallen and broken creation? Are we astonished by the series of progressive covenants leading to Christ, and the New Covenant prophesied about in Jer. 31? Do we stop to marvel at the amazing reality that the same power that rose Jesus from the grave dwells within us as the Body of Christ? Or are we content with spiritual milk? Are we satisfied with the first step of the journey? That step being, accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior and repenting of your sins.

This is the question I pose this month, milk or meat? In our spiritual walks have we endeavored to go deep, to know God more fully? To give us a general indicator, you can ask yourself this question; Am I comfortable and willing to disciple a fellow brother or sister in Christ, or do I feel like I need someone to disciple me? Paul encourages us to grow in maturity in Romans, "Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship.<sup>2</sup> Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will," (Rom. 12:1-2, NIV). Paul also, in the book of Hebrews, warns his audience about not becoming spiritually mature, "13 Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness. <sup>14</sup> But solid food is for the mature, who by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil." (Hebrew 5:13-14, NIV) By being spiritually mature we are able to discern the Lord's perfect will, as well as distinguish between good and evil. All of which is necessary when we consider the Great Commission by Jesus.

<sup>18</sup> Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.<sup>19</sup> Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Mt. 28:18-20) Notice it does not say make converts, or sway people to my philosophy, rather Jesus wants us to make Disciples.

I once had a good pastor friend tell me that everyone needs at least 3 types of people with them on their spiritual walk; 1) someone to teach and disciple them, 2) someone whom they can disciple, and 3) a friend on the same level to share the journey with (Teacher, Disciple, Friend). I write this to encourage everyone to desire the deep things of God, fostering the vertical relationship, so that you may bless those around you in your horizontal relationships (Vertical = you and God, Horizontal = you and the world around you). I strongly encourage you to find your Teacher, Disciple, and Friend, no matter where you are in your journey. One of the best ways to do this is getting connected with a study group. I can personally attest to the benefits of small groups. If you need more information about current groups running, or desire to start one of your own (either teach, facilitate, or host, all are possible), please reach out to one of the Elders or me to discuss the possibility.

<u>The First Presbyterian Emergency Food Pantry is now</u> <u>established!</u> Over the years our pastors have encountered hungry people who came to our doors looking for help. Of course, they were referred to the local food banks, but these are not always open. We saw a need to be able to give these people something that they could eat immediately, without the need for preparation or eating utensils, until they could visit one of the other local pantries.

Thanks to all who donated, there are now eleven bags of

ready to eat food items that are available to individuals and families who come to our church looking for help, and plenty more items on the shelf for resupply! Each bag includes hand sanitizer, and a card with information about food banks in the area with contact information and hours of operation. Cash donations provided for the purchase of Subway gift cards as well.

**Operation Christmas Child** - Samaritan's Purse has been sending Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes to boys and girls around the world for 30 years! In that time there have been 200+ million gift boxes delivered, 50+ million boys and girls discipled, 17+ million decisions made for Christ, and 1.7 million The Greatest Journey teachers trained. What an impact from a simple little box filled with basic items!

Once again we want to enable our First Folks who want to do their part. There are three ways to participate:

1. Pick up one or more shoeboxes. Inside will be a label, which includes information on what and what not to pack, how to make your \$10 donation, and how to track your box if you choose to. Go shopping, pack your box, attach the adhesive label, and return to the church. DO NOT TAPE the box shut, a rubber band is fine.

2. Build a box online by visiting www.samaritanspurse.org/occ. Click on Pack a Shoebox, then from the drop down menu select Build a Shoebox Online. Click on Create a Goal Page, then search for First Presbyterian Church South Boston VA. In this way we can track the number of boxes our folks have built online. The cost is \$25, payable by credit card.

3. Contribute to our packing party. Make a contribution of \$25, payable to First Presbyterian Church, marked OCC. We will take those contributions and purchase items for packing as many shoeboxes as we can. On November 12, immediately after worship, we will have a pizza and packing party where the young folks (and anyone else who would like to help) will assemble and pack the boxes.

The last day to turn in boxes to the church is November 12. Last year's goal was 30 boxes and we exceeded that number. This year our goal is 50 boxes. Let's make it happen!


"These families survived five months of war, terror and targeted persecution by Islamist forces and finally reached the comparative safety of the Nuba mountains.

#### Since our last Newsletter, our Session on October 15th, discussed:

- 1. Rev. Coleman opened the meeting with prayer.
- 2. News of the congregation was shared.
- 3. Minutes of the September 17<sup>th</sup> Stated Session Meeting were approved.
- 4. Next Presbytery Meeting November 16, 2023, FPC Lynchburg (Don Cherry Commissioner)
- 5. Membership Roll A review of the membership roll is currently underway.
- 6. The Session approved allowing Bob Hughes (Habitat for Humanity) to continue to operate the Habitat office in our church and that appropriate signage be allowed.
- 7. PNC Report The Presbytery Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM) will recommend John McCarthy for enrolment as an Inquirer at the November Presbytery meeting.
- 8. Next communion date is Sunday, December 17, 2023.
- 9. Approved a Called Congregational Meeting after worship on Sunday, November 17 for the purpose of electing officers for the Class of 2026 and to review the 2024 Budget.
- 10. Plans are well underway for the Community Cornhole Tournament scheduled for Sunday, October 29<sup>th</sup> at 2 pm.
- 11. Local Missions
  - a) The non-perishable food drive ended October 16<sup>th</sup> with good participation.
  - b) Our Operation Christmas Child (OCC) shoeboxes drive begins on October 22nd. A packing party will be held on Sunday, November 12th after the Worship Service.
- International Missions The emergency tarp initiative for the displaced people in the Nuba mountains of Sudan, our church campaign had total donations of \$2400 (enough for fifty (50) tarps and some mosquito nets).
- 13. Property
  - a) Rick Harrell presented a final update on the repair/renovation of the manse.
  - b) The church front doors are being restored at a cost of \$1800 plus materials.
- 14. Budget & Finance Financial reports for September 2023 were reviewed.
- 15. Rev. Coleman closed the meeting with prayer.
