Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love



What is Advent? We all know generally what Advent is, a time a preparation leading up to Christmas. Advent, the word itself, comes from a Latin root meaning, "A coming to". So, within the context of Christmas, Advent is the coming of Jesus Christ, and we spend this season taking a closer look at the story of Jesus' birth and what that meant to the people of Israel, as well as the rest of the world. The four Sundays of Advent are titled with what Jesus brought to the dark and broken world, Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.

<u>Hope:</u> Jesus came as a light in the darkness, shining like a beacon, with the hope of salvation!

<u>Peace:</u> The Gospel message brings the Lord's peace through the Holy Spirit, and with the knowledge that there is hope, the chaos of this world can be withstood through the Lord's strength.

Joy: There is great joy to be had in our reconciliation to God the Father, through God the Son, and by the power of God the Holy Spirit. When is the last time you jumped for joy because you have been saved from your sins and have the Holy Spirit dwelling within you? When is the last time you shouted Hallelujah! You are covered by the blood of the Lamb and have been made new through the Holy Spirit. This is a time for celebration because Jesus came into the world! Go tell it on the mountain that Jesus Christ is born! Let us not lose that original fire and joy in our hearts we felt when we first believed and received power through the Holy Spirit.

Love: God is love, and God showed His everlasting love through the sacrifice of His only begotten son Jesus. While yet we were enemies of God, Jesus died for us and reconciled us to the Father (Romans 5:10). God has spent millennia working out salvation history for our benefit, so that sin and death could never again take hold in our hearts and snatch us away from our loving Father in heaven. From the moment sin entered the world in Genesis 3, God told us, "15 And I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head, and you will strike his heel." This was God's first promise of salvation. From that point on we have been under the covenant of grace with the cross as the climax of the story, but ultimately culminating in Christ's second coming, and the new heavens and new earth, but most importantly, God dwelling with His beloved children forever. It is a covenant of grace because grace is an undeserved gift. Through God's perfect justice and righteousness everyone stands condemned, but God loved us too much to leave the story there. "16 For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. ¹⁷ For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him." (John 3:16-17, NIV) "13 And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love." (1 Cor. 13:13) The Love of God is incomprehensible, but we can feel it through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, and this is why we celebrate the Advent (the coming) of Jesus Christ. This love in our hearts is the amazing, good news that needs to be shared.

However, as we go through our lives with all the hustle and bustle of our daily responsibilities, the joy we felt as children at Christmas can start to fade. The excitement of lights and traditions can start to feel like burdensome responsibilities. "Whose house do we visit?" "Where did all these decorations come from, and when will I have the time ...

to put them up?" "What event do I need to get the kids to, and what am I responsible for?" There is a song by Faith Hill from the movie *How The Grinch Stole Christmas* that speaks to these feelings very well, and without even realizing it, the song shows us our need for God. Because we lose that feeling of the Christmas spirit as we get older, because we lose sight of the true reason we celebrate, and

that is God's love. The song starts out, "Where are you Christmas, why can't I find you? Why have you gone away, where is the laughter you used to bring me? Why can't I hear music play? My world is changing, I'm rearranging. Does that mean Christmas changes too?" Have you ever felt that way?

The climax of the song says, "If there is love in your heart and your mind, you will feel like Christmas all the time... I know I've found you, you never fade away." God never fades, and it is Jesus in our hearts that produces the love of God, which is everlasting. The Advent season helps us to refocus and see clearly the Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love that came with Jesus, and continues with us until He comes again. I pray you have a very Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year! ~ John

Persecution Project Foundation (PPF) – A Story of 3 Heroes

In April, 2023, war erupted on the streets of Khartoum, Sudan's capital city. The fighting began between two Islamist generals, but this meant little to the people living in the suburb of Ombada.

Many Nuba had left their native homeland to find jobs and educational opportunities in the big city. They brought their unique culture to Khartoum, but also their faith, as many of the Nuba are Christian-- even though Sudan is an officially Islamic State.

The neighborhood of Ombada quickly became a battlefield, as competing armies fought for control of more turf. Shelling, bombing, sniper fire, and pitched street battles engulfed the area. The Nuba could do nothing but hunker down in their homes and pray they would not be

hit by bombs, or shot by rooftop snipers if they dared venture outside. During this crisis, several heroes emerged. This story focuses on three.

The first two heroes are Christians from the local Nuba church in Ombada. Two men decided they must do something to help their brothers and sisters escape the violence and evacuate to the comparative safety of the Nuba mountains. The men contacted friends in the Nuba, who somehow arranged for a few buses to be chartered in Khartoum for the purpose of transporting women and children out.

Over the course of a few weeks, the men, named Moses and Emmanuel, shepherded nearly 2,000 women and children onto buses, and sent them south to the Nuba!

But this story is about three heroes, not two. The third hero of this story is *you*. For, you see, the people Moses and Emmanuel contacted for help were Persecution Project staff working in the Nuba mountains. It was Persecution Project supporters like you whose generosity chartered those buses carrying nearly 2,000 lives to safety.

This story is a beautiful testament to how greatly God can use a few people when they decide to engage in "Active Compassion for the Persecuted."

The Greatest Gift

Because of this special child, the prison doors of death are open; we are not condemned to die and be lost forever. We can have joy today and always. We all sin. We all have need to be freed from captivity of sin and death. Because of Him, we have promise of everlasting joy. Returning to the presence of our Father in Heaven and life eternal. Operation Christmas Child - This year we set a goal of filling 50 shoeboxes. We had individuals that donated boxes, some were filled on-line, and we held our first packing party, which was a huge success! And thanks to you we met our goal – the most boxes we have filled in recent memory!

What happens next? Long before shoeboxes arrive in more than 100 countries, volunteer National Leadership Teams train pastors and community leaders who want to share the message of the Gospel and



bless children. Pastors around the world deliver the gifts to children as a part of outreach events in places where people may not know Christ and invite them to follow Him. In many places, they also offer The Greatest Gift, a Gospel story booklet Samaritan's Purse developed for shoebox recipients, and invite children to participate in The Greatest Journey discipleship program.

The following is just one amazing story that occurred due to people like you donating a shoebox with simple gifts inside:

Pastor Waisea Liwaiono hosted an Operation Christmas Child outreach and gift distribution in Vunika, a rural community in Fiji that had no church. He then invited the children to attend The Greatest Journey discipleship program. As the students gathered for Bible lessons, their parents grew curious and began attending, too. The local witch doctor became a believer and offered his property as a place for the new church to meet. Today 80 people attend regularly, and five additional churches have been started in surrounding villages!

What greater Christmas gift can we give?!?!
