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
The Harvest is Plentiful

This time of year always brings out the pumpkins and hay bales as people celebrate the harvest. In Christian teaching, the metaphor of the harvest is frequently used to illustrate the work of evangelism. The concept draws from agricultural life, familiar to many during biblical times, making it a relatable and powerful image for explaining spiritual truths. The harvest signifies a season of gathering fruit from seeds that have been sown, nurtured, and cared for—a process that mirrors the journey of sharing the message of faith and bringing people into a relationship with God.

Scripture is filled with references to the harvest as a symbol for spiritual work. For example, Jesus said in Matthew 9:37-38, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Here, the field represents the world, and the harvest represents people who are ready to receive the good news. This imagery communicates urgency, opportunity, and the need for active participation.

Stages of Spiritual Growth:

- * Sowing the Seed: Evangelism often begins with sowing—sharing the message of hope and truth with others. Just like seeds need to be planted in the earth, the gospel must be shared in people's hearts through words, actions, and relationships.
- * Nurturing: After planting, farmers water, weed, and care for their crops. Similarly, evangelism is not just a one-time act; it involves building relationships, answering questions, providing encouragement, and demonstrating love.



* The Harvest: When the time is right, crops are gathered. In evangelism, this represents the moment when individuals respond to the internal call God puts on their heart and embrace and profess that Jesus Christ is their Lord and savior. They are born again through the power of the Holy Spirit. This is the time we are living in! The Church today has the wonderful privilege of bringing these new disciples into the fold "baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything [Jesus] commanded you."

Lesson for the Church today:

- * Recognize the Season: Just as farmers know when to plant and harvest, evangelists must discern when people are ready to hear and respond. Sensitivity and wisdom are vital.
- * Work Together: Harvesting is rarely a solo task; it requires teamwork. Evangelism, too, is a collective effort—as part of a community, believers support one another in reaching out.
- * Labor with Expectation: The image of the harvest encourages the Church to work with hope, anticipating a rich yield. Even if results are not immediate, faithful labor will ultimately bring in a harvest.



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
The harvest is a vivid and enduring illustration for the Great Commission, reminding us that spiritual growth, and gathering the harvest, requires dedication, patience, and cooperation. Just as a farmer rejoices in a successful harvest, so too does the Christian community celebrate when lives are transformed as they believe in their hearts and profess with their mouths that Jesus is Lord and risen savior (Rom. 10:9). Embracing this metaphor inspires disciples of Christ to engage wholeheartedly in the work of sharing the Good News of the Gospel, confident that their efforts contribute to a greater spiritual harvest.

The current spiritual climate seems to indicate we are on the verge of another Great Awakening! So, Church, pray for more workers because, "the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Praise be to God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!


Tee Godbold Memorial - update

In Psalm 85:8, we read, "I will hear what God the Lord will speak: for he will speak peace unto his people." John 14:1 "Let not your heart be troubled" and in vs 18 "I will not leave you

comfortless: I will come to you." And then in vs 27, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you, not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

I am grateful for the knowledge that "all will be well". Perhaps not right now and today. We do have to continue to deal with trials of our faith.

Many church leaders call for us to be peacemakers. Christ taught His disciples at the Sermon on the Mount "Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God. Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven". (Matthew 5:9-10 KJV). Christ repeatedly tells us "If ye love me, keep my commandments.

These scriptures and many others give me peace and hope. I know that Christ is over all and sees and knows our needs. He wants the world to follow Him. He will give us strength to persevere if we trust Him and turn to Him. As we turn to Christ, reading scripture and trusting His word we will be better able to do as we read "Let your hearts be comforted,... for all flesh is in mine hands; be still and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

What better blessing can we ask? We can find comfort! We know God. He has us in His hand and as we turn to him and become peacemakers, we will feel peace no matter what wickedness prevails around us. Let God Prevail! ~ Sherolyn
